## **Gliding Adventures**

On a glorious sunny June day, Mrs McGonigle (Assistant Headteacher) was joined by colleagues Mr Fisher (Student Support Officer), Mrs Cliffe (Teaching Assistant) and Mr Cooper (Science Teacher) to take 20 lucky students for their first flight with Peterborough and Spalding Gliding Club. As students approached the airfield there was great excitement, and quite a few nerves!

A British Gliding Association pilot taught students about the parachutes they needed to wear throughout the flight, ensuring that they knew what to do in the event of an emergency. They were then taught how to enter the glider, strap themselves into the seat and all about the different instruments that surrounded them in the cockpit.


After some pre-flight checks, the gliders were towed into the air by 'tug planes' before the pilot released the tow rope when the glider had reached an appropriate height. Students described the experience of flying without an engine as 'tranquil, serene and incredibly quiet.' From the cockpit they could take photographs of the earth far below and see the world with a bird's eye view.

Each student was able to spend around 40 minutes gliding, learning about how each of the controls worked and how pilots use thermals in the air to help the glider soar and move around. Under the watchful eye of their instructor, each student was even able to take control of the aircraft and experience the feeling of manoeuvring something through the air. This was a fantastic experience that demanded not only a steady hand, but also real bravery to do something that none of our young people had experienced before.

At the end of an incredibly exciting and challenging day, the students all left with a real sense of achievement having faced their fears and a framed certificate to keep forever.

None of this would have been possible without the fantastic support of Mrs Penny Walkinshaw, the Air Gliding League, Nicholas White, Kevin Fear, Peter Hardingham, Mike Newton and many others who took such good care of our young pilots.

A group of lucky Year 10 students were involved in creating and serving a feast of Eastern dishes to the Heads of House, Student Support Officers and the Senior Leadership Team. The competitive atmosphere in food room 308 pushed these 11 students to their limits, but they all rose to the challenge, demonstrating excellent resilience and perseverance to serve up some wonderful food.

Led by 'Head Chef' Mr Nawaz (Deputy Curriculum Area Leader) the students created and served a series of mouthwatering dishes: Peshawari Namak Mandi Lamb Kharahi, Aurbergine Masala, Chicken Fried Rice, Sweet and Sour Chicken, Chana (Chick Peas) Curry and Red Kidney Bean Masalah all served with Naan Bread, Fresh Punjabi Salad and Raita.
