As we come to the end of another extremely busy, very long Autumn Term, I would like to thank members of staff for all the extra classes:

educational trips; sporting fixtures; evening occasions and charity events which they have organised this term. In addition, we have held eight Saturday Schools this term for Year 11 and our Breakfast Club for Year 8 Maths are very successful.

We are delighted to have been awarded the Living Sport 'School of the Year Award' for the second year running. This is in addition to being awarded the Heart FM 'Community Heroes' Award in two categories; for our Boxfit work in the community and for the work our Sports Leaders play in our Cluster Primary Schools. We were also delighted to be recognised as a Sport Leaders Academy, the only school in the Eastern region to be

Tara Forkin, a sixth form student was presented with this prestigious award which recognises the dedication and exceptional commitment of learners studying the British Sign Language (BSL) qualifications.



Tara is profoundly deaf but that has not stopped her from achieving her goals: Signature Level 3 NVQ/Certificate in British Sign Language, a strong GCSE grade set, Youth committee member for the PDDCS (Peterborough & District Deaf Children's Society), Duke of Edinburgh Awards, A level studies and much more.

The School would like to congratulate Tara and thank Paul-Michael Coldham for all his support and dedication to the achievements of the deaf learners at Jack Hunt School. He nominated Tara for the award and has enabled Tara and many other students and staff from Jack Hunt School and the local community to achieve accreditation in BSL; ranging from Level 1 to Level 6.

Design Technology

In October, a group of students from Years 11 and 12 went to the Engineering Festival at the Imperial War Museum,
