Two hundred and sixty seven students aged 14-15 went out to 245 employers who represented 53 occupational areas in Peterborough and London. These included Sales, Hairdressing, Sports & Leisure, Animal Welfare, Mechanics and the Armed Forces. The School received huge amounts of praise and positive comments from employers and many students had a really memorable experience.

On Wednesday 20 June 2012 a Celebration Evening was held at the School where parents, employers, staff and Governors were invited to recognise the top 30 students who had been nominated to receive awards. These students were presented with certificates and reward vouchers which were presented by Mrs Kilbey and the evening ended with photos and celebration cake.

Jack Hunt Students Clean Up at Eco Awards

The Peterborough Eco Awards were held at Ken Stimpson School this year. Schools from all over Peterborough took part and displayed the fantastic Sustainability work they had been doing; from school gardens to toy swap shops, recycled art work and bikethon challenges. The Jack Hunt miniature Garden Display was a big hit from the beginning, attracting a lot of attention and compliments from the other schools. After our Eco Reps had presented our stall to the judges there was a lot of fun to be had. Firstly, we made seed bombs with the Forestry Commission. Next, the Eco Reps took part in a 60 minute makeover of the Ken Stimpson gardens and finally we got involved in Eco crafts and were shown how to knit with old T-shirts, make jewellery from old cardboard and create fashion from old carrier bags. The judges from Peterborough City Council and PECT were very impressed by our projects and Jack Hunt School had to take to the stage three times, easily winning the Eco Factor Award voted for by other schools. Junior Maths Challenge

Jack Hunt students achieved 2 Gold, 10 Silver and 13 Bronze Awards in this year's UKMT Junior Maths Challenge. Over 240,000 pupils from across the UK sat the Junior Maths Challenge in April, with the top 6% receiving a Gold Certificate, the next 13% Silver and the next 21% Bronze.

The highest achievers were Calvin Lee 8BDR who received Best in School, Best in Year 8 and a Gold Certificate and Stephen Miller 7NATR who received Best in Year 7 and a Gold Certificate.

KEEPING YOUR CHILD SAFE ONLINE

I was asked at a recent parents evening, "How can I keep my son safe online". This is an ever increasing concern because from smartphones to tablets, games consoles to computers, getting online has never been easier, so it is becoming increasingly important to protect your child's safety on the net. Here are my top tips to keep your child safe online:

Parental Controls

Parental controls are a great way of controlling the content your kids can access. They allow you to block selected websites and email addresses by adding them to a filter list. They also prevent your kids from searching certain words. Child-friendly search engines such as Yahoo Kids or Ask Jeeves for Kids, lets your children search the internet safely as they filter out inappropriate sites and content. Contact your ISP (Internet Service Provider) to find out any child safety measures they offer if you are not sure.

Setting Ground Rules with your Child

It's a good idea to set some ground rules with your child when thinking about their safety online and include their input when doing so. Here at Jack Hunt we teach our pupils to be digital citizens and speak to them about the potential risks online to help them understand the dangers. It would help us if you could also tell your child:

- Not to give out any personal information to people online such as names, addresses, phone numbers, bank details, passwords
- · To only visit chat rooms that are fully moderated/supervised
- Not to meet an online friend in person without you knowing/allowing them to do so
- Not to have an email/screen-name address that references their age or gender
- Be mindful when posting status updates, photos or video on social networking sites
- To tell you if they experience anything inappropriate that worries them
- Take regular breaks from the computer.

Tips for family Internet usage

An easy way to make sure your child is safe online is to have the computer in a family room with the screen in view. Draw up house rules such as Internet usage hours and sites that are off limits. It's also never best to download unknown files from the Internet unless you know it is from a reliable source. The majority of computers and other digital technologies all now have measures in place to protect your child's safety online and these, coupled with your input, should mean our young people are better equipped for the digital future.

Jack Hunt Cluster Holiday Club – Summer 2012


