Celebrating Work Experience



On Thursday 20 June 2013 we celebrated the students' efforts and achievements with parents, employers, staff and Governors. The top 35 students were nominated to receive awards having shown a positive attitude from the start and exceeding all the school's expectations. They were each presented with a certificate and reward voucher by Mrs Kilbey who expressed how proud she was of the students and thanked the employers especially those new to the scheme.

Kimberley Lines winner of the Platinum Award for Outstanding Performance said "Working at Peterborough FM was an enjoyable and informative experience, opening up the possibility of a career in media. Whilst

there, I was able to host two of my own radio shows along with Tihesia Riley-Bennett. We were invited back to the radio station to host our own one hour show each week for a month. I did a lot whilst I was there and it was great to be recognised at the awards evening."

Almost 300 Year 10 students went out to 225 employers in May, representing 53 occupational areas. These included Sales, Hairdressing, Sports & Leisure, Animal Welfare, Mechanics and the Armed Forces in May. These work placements give students and invaluable opportunity to gain knowledge and experience through work related learning.

One lucky student, Hollie Forman secured a week of her work placement at Buckingham Palace. Hollie had hoped to gain a better insight into how the Royal Household worked and while there she experienced a number of different departments. These included working the switchboard, working with the Garden Party Organisation Team, Royal Transportation and Privy Purse Finance. She said "I think this experience has left me with a more open mind. My time has been incredible and I'm very thankful to everyone who has given me the opportunity to have a week's placement at the Palace, it gave me everything I hoped for. I got a real insight into how the structure of the Household works and I learnt a lot more about the Royal Family! I even got to see a couple of members."

Carol Hinds, Work experience Co-ordinator said, "This year is the fourth year I have been involved in the year 10's work experience. It has always been a difficult task to choose the top students from the placement feedback and this year was no exception. During the two weeks the students have proved they are hardworking, confident, mature, creative and resourceful. The Celebration evening was also an enormous success. Well done to all our Year 10 students, especially the top 35."

Supporting African Children

Once again students at Jack Hunt have helped to improve children's lives in Kenya. Students in Year 9 designed and made toys and games for the children in their D&T lessons. Mr Hargreaves, leading the project collected donations of subject books for English, Maths and Science as well as primary and secondary reading books and all sorts of equipment for the classroom, some of which were kindly donated by local primary schools in Peterborough. These included computers, computer software and school uniform. He also received football shirts from Lincoln and Peterborough Football Clubs along with 25 footballs – which were donated to schools, an orphanage football team and local football teams in Kenya. In total 163 boxes were shipped to Watamu in March and Mr Hargreaves was there to organise the distribution and make sure the various projects received the donations.

Bethany Junior Academy consists of four classrooms and a Nursery so the staff and children were delighted with the generous donations. Other

beneficiaries included Dabaso Primary school and two orphanages all based in Watamu. Mr Hargreaves said, "This has been a huge project to undertake but it was wonderful to see how it will change the children's lives".

Student Council Host Annual Schools Conference

The Student Council, which held its first meeting in February 2012, consists of 30 students, elected by their form and house to represent student views across the school. Each house is represented by a Year 7, 8 and 9 student ,one from Year 10 or 11 and one from Year 12 or 13. At the first meeting of the year the Student Council elects their leaders - Chair, Vice Chair and Secretary.

The Student Council meets 12 times a year to review policies (such as mobile phone, behaviour and anti-bullying) and make plans for change. In the last 18 months they have suggested changes to the toilets and school uniform. Members of the Senior Leadership Team are invited to hear the students' opinions and proposed changes. The Council are also

responsible for helping organise and run the Community Christmas Party.



On Friday 28 June, Jack Hunt organised the first annual Student Council Conference linking with King's School, Voyager Academy, Nene Park Academy, Arthur Mellows Village College, Kings Lynn Academy and a representative from Comberton Village College. The purpose of the conference was to evaluate the progress and success of Student Councils across Peterborough as well as building partnerships with other school councils. The student council members gave presentations in the morning and then broke out into workshops in the afternoon. The feedback from the students was that the conference was "very helpful"; "a confidence booster" and that they "gained ideas" and "had been inspired" by the days events. Staff were also very positive about the event saying it was "very well organised" and "exceeded expectations". There was an unanimous decision to attend next year and several of the schools have already made an action plan to work together next year including holding cross-school visits, a Parliament trip and a Leadership Day.

Swapping Classroom for the Boardroom

On Friday 3 May, 50 enterprising Year 8 students swapped the classroom for the boardroom when they took part in the Natwest Enterprise Challenge. This challenge aims to support young people in learning how to manage their personal finances. NatWest staff, Stephen Grubb (Banking Director) and Helen Augsburger (Business Relations Manager), were on-hand to advise and support the students during the challenge.

The students were split into 12 teams with the aim of launching a brand new coffee shop to attract as many new customers as possible. Each team needed to work effectively to investigate financial planning and management. They started off by identifying personal skills to organise

themselves into job roles including a Project Manager, Marketing Executive, Catering Consultant and Finance Officer.

During the day each team had to design a company name and logo and plan and interesting and cost effective menu. They also undertook some activities to show the importance of marketing to run a successful business. All the Enterprise students needed to call on many skills including effective communication, excellent teamwork as well as the application of numeracy and problem solving skills. The objective of the exercise was to plan and deliver a group presentation to convince financial backers that the launch of the new coffee shop would be successful and on budget.



Helen was nominated to judge the different groups and was looking for not only at the presentation but also how the group worked as a team, how accurate the costing they calculated were, how appealing was the menu they had designed and how creative the team had been in devising a name and logo. Helen was so impressed with the students work that she award two teams first place, saying, "The group of youngsters really worked hard and came up with some fantastic ideas. It was lovely to see such enthusiasm in them and they were so polite."

All of the Year 8 students who took part in the challenge were brilliant, a real credit to themselves and the School.

Deaf Awareness Week

From the 6 - 10 May the staff and students recognised Deaf Awareness Week with a number of events around the school all designed to raise awareness. Katie Bocking (Year 13) and Ayesha Quraishy (Year 12) both deaf, delivered deaf awareness assemblies to all six school houses (over 1700 students) sharing their experiences of how different the world is when you are deaf and the challenges they face in everyday situations. They also showed how cochlear



implants can make an enormous difference and surprised students with the £30.000 cost of these life changing devices. Students were invited to a 'Fingerspellathon' to raise funds for the National Deaf Children's Society (NDCS) and over 100 students gathered to learn the fingerspelling alphabet culminating with the whole group spelling the word 'Fingerspellathon'. Students who attended made a donation to the NDCS which will help them improve the lives of more deaf children.

A group of deaf and hearing students headed by Calum Daly (Year 10) produced a deaf awareness video 'How to Stay Safe in a Mainstream School'. The video was the winning entry in the national 'Children's Create!' competition and can be found on the Jack Hunt website.

Eight Jack Hunt School deaf students visited Middleton Primary School to lead mini sports activities with the deaf pupils to raise the profile of the upcoming Deaflympics event taking place in Sofia, Bulgaria later this summer. They were joined by nine primary deaf students aged 4-11 who took part in multi-skills activities using bean bags and hoops.

A number of deaf students also undertook the St Johns Ambulance Youth First Aid Course, a challenge for any young person, covering all aspects of first aid from bleeding to resuscitation. This was not only challenging for the students but also the trainer and members of staff were on hand to offer guidance on how normal training practise can be modified for a person with hearing loss. The whole week culminated with a Charity Family Fun Day held at the school which offered advice and access to support for parents and children living with hearing loss.







Peterborough Telegraph Awards Recognise Outstanding Achievements



This month, the Peterborough Evening Telegraph held their Education Awards. Local people were asked to nominate students and staff from schools in the local area. Great schooling achievements were recognised and Jack Hunt School had an excellent show of faces for the

awards evening with six finalists across five categories.

Elizabeth Bowes was nominated in the Best Pupil Aged 11-16 by Mrs Simpson-Holley for training as a Communication Leader, observing staff and offering them feedback to improve learning and teaching, as well as being a Reading Buddy and designing lessons to deliver at local primary schools. Mrs Simpson-Holley added, "Elizabeth always has a smile on her face!"

Chloe Peacock was also nominated in this category as despite many complicated medical conditions she has always been a delight to teach. Outside of school, Chloe took up her passion, gymnastics and through hard work and dedication she is now at Squad Level and frequently

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competes. She has won many medals ending last year as Junior Club champion and is hoping to get into the County Squad this year. Not content with this, she has recently taken up Taekwondo and has just passed her first grading.

Brandon Coulter, was nominated for Most Improved Student by Mr Blant. He had found starting school a real struggle but with the support of staff along with his own self-belief has managed to achieve the government's target for schools of five A*-C including English and Maths. This is a great achievement for all young people - but for someone who has found growing up a struggle it is massive and deserves a

pat on the back. Brandon's mum was especially proud of him and showed her appreciation of Brandon's teachers saying "I only gave birth to Brandon that was the easy part, Mr Blant and Mrs Hamilton made him into the person he is today."

The Jack Hunt PE Department nominated student Isaac Huskisson for Outstanding Sporting Achiever following his amazing athletic results. This year he smashed his personal best for the boys' hammer and won a competition for the discus. Isaac has now thrown the qualifying distance for English Schools Championships and hopes to be included in the Cambridgeshire Team.

Tara Forkin, a profoundly deaf student at Jack Hunt, received a nomination for Best School/Pupil Contribution to the Community. She completed British Sign Language levels 1, 2 and 3 within two years. The Level 3 course (equivalent to an A Level course) was

completed during her GCSE studies. With mentoring from a deaf BSL tutor, Tara was offered a BSL teaching post despite her young age, only 17. Tara has also been a very active member of

the local deaf children's charity for a number of years, joining their Youth Committee at the age of 15. She has been involved in various projects, including a Design Technology enterprise project creating and selling a range of promotional items. She also very courageously undertook a sky dive with two deaf peers just six weeks after her cochlear implant, raising over £4,000 for charity.

We also had a member of staff nominated for Support Staff Award – Nan Bowden Personal Assistant to the Headteacher. Nan has worked at the school for 28 years and, as well as working in other departments in the school, has been a fantastic Personal Assistant to five of the six Headteachers the school has had. She also supports our governing body as Clerk to the Governors and is Secretary of the Jack Hunt Community Learning Trust. Nan was nominated for the Award by
